Please explain your answer:

Although it is beneficial to reduce the burden on Local Authorities by repeated, vexatious and frivolous FOI requests, any changes implemented should be in line with UK Fees and charges which is £450 which, on a standard rate of £25 per hour, is 18 hours. The Act has been in force there for 25 years and works well. There should be an appropriate limit and if it is challenged, the fact we have aligned with another jurisdiction and on a tried-and-tested formula, should assist.

No, the legislation, fees and standards need to be universally applied to all LA's to keep it consistent to all. Inconsistency makes it easier to challenge and show it is unreasonable. It will drive change and provide a fair service to residents.

No, if an organisation is being trusted with public monies, they should be accountable and operating in a way that data is managed correctly. I would argue that it is far simpler for a smaller organisation to pull records than a larger one. FOI legislation is also about correct management of public records. This is back to keeping authorities small to keep rates down. Standards need to be universal.

There should not be any fees (you can charge for photocopying, postage, etc in the UK) but there should be an appropriate limit

There needs to be some sort of barrier to stop time wasting and the implementation of a mechanism such as suggested in question 2 would suffice without the introduction of a fee. It is not right to restrict members of the public who are restricted financially. They may be the people who need the information for genuine purpose i.e. medical processes, complaints etc

No fee should be implemented.

It will cost more to process an invoice and charge people, also delaying the process until the fee is paid. It is difficult to estimate how long each FOI will take before answering the question. The ones that take the longest are those that ask for "all information" in relation to a subject that may have been going on years. This is a reflection of internal governance and email

communications being kept for longer than one year. Some FOI requests return up to 10,000 email communications that need to be redacted.
